Hi Everyone,


I know we have waited quite a while for the junior rebuild to be completed but I have recently been notified that the expected completion date is **Monday 17**<sup>th</sup> **May**!


To celebrate the Grand Opening of the Junior Section, we will have a coffee van and a few nibbles which will be set up out the front of the Foundation Area.

#### **NAPLAN**

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) 2021 tests for Year 3 and Year 5 students will be held online at school during the weeks of Monday 10<sup>th</sup> May 2021-Friday 21<sup>st</sup> May 2021.NAPLAN tests assess student knowledge and skills in writing, reading, language and numeracy. NAPLAN test results will be distributed to parents/carers in Term 3.

The AtoSS is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist your child's school to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, bullying and life in general. Hi Boys and Girls

My name is Bill and I am 92 years old. I am Lara's grandfather. When I was your age WW2 began, it was 1939.

My parents, me and my brother were living in a 4 story apartment house in a big city in Germany.

Very often at night time there were air raids.

Loud sirens let us know planes with bombs were flying over.

There was loud gunfire heard from guns trying to shoot the planes down. Everybody in the apartment ran down the stairs to a place called the cellar, where it was safer.

At the end of an air raid these sirens gave the all clear.

These air raids happened so often that as children we were too tired to go to school. Because of this the government sent us to safer areas in the country. These were camps, we had a teacher and a political leader.

We had no parents with us.

We had to look after ourselves and maintain the camp. We had to do all the cleaning. This was very hard, there was no hot water. In Winter the water in our enamel wash basins would freeze.

We had to made our own bed and every morning there was room inspections. It was very strict, our beds had blankets with 3 stripes, these needed to be vertically lined up when made. Shoes were kept spotless with not one item of clothing out of place.

If you had a hole in a sock you had to sew it yourself. The camp had no kitchen. For our meals, twice a day we had to walk 20 minutes to a convent. In wintertime we had to walk in snow storms.

Every day we had school classes and sport. Each camp lasted a school year and in between camps we went home. In July 1943 when I was home between camps our apartment was bombed. The sound of the sirens indicating of the incoming air raid. I remember we were in the cellar and bombs were exploding very close to us. The sound was so bad and your ears felt like they were going to burst.

I was nursing my 2 ½ year old sister on my knees. All of a sudden, the lights went out, the house was collapsing. Smoke started to build up, we had to get out. People were panicking and running, you just followed the person in front to get out. Bricks were falling down around you, I ran 200 meters while carrying my sister to a bunker.

The bunker was shaped like a light house with thick concrete walls and a long ramp instead of stairs inside, winding itself to the top. Lots of people had run there to be safe. In the morning I went to look for my family as we had been separated during our escape from the apartment.

I wasn't sure if they were still alive. There was destruction of both property and life

scattered around me. There was great jubilation when I found them in an underground tunnel. We had to leave Hamburg as we had no where to live, only the clothes we were wearing. We went to stay with my Aunty in a small village in a different part of Germany. It was 400 kms away and we travelled there by different trains.

There was no high school there, so I was sent to another school camp. This was my 4<sup>th</sup> camp, it was in Grabsleben, the provincial High School was in Gotha 5kms away, a long way to school. We worked on a farm for half a day to pay for our food. The rest of the day we did school work and youth training with some army training. This was when I was 15 years old.

In the beginning of April 1945 when I was 16, a political leader said to us' there are soldiers here in rehab and they need help'. We need you as young soldiers to help them to defend our country. Hurrah! No more school. Most of us were enthusiastic to be assigned to assist the regular Army. We were taken 200kms away to a place called Sonderhausen and that was where we saw action. Filling sand bags to build a protection wall was the first task. Action started that night. Around midnight the firing stopped but they bombed the town.

By dawn we were told to march to Berlin. As we were hiking through the forest the grenades were exploding close to us and we had to run very, very quickly to save ourselves. We left our weapons behind it was a frightful experience for a 16 year old.

At the end of the cliff we saw a road and a convoy of trucks and jeeps. We went towards them and realised that they were Americans. The people in the street told us to hide as we had our uniforms on. I decided to make my way home but a curfew stated you were only allowed 5km from home. I travelled cross country as a farm hand carrying a pitchfork. Luck held out until a few kilometres from home.

There I was detained by an American patrol. They asked for ID, which I didn't have for that village, so they locked me up for 2 days, there were lots of other people locked up as well.

The war was over.

After the war I was not happy and felt cheated. My childhood had been taken from me. I was fed up with Germany and what it had to offer me. Germany was always at war every 25 years. I looked at my dad and thought 'is this where I want to be in 25 years?'

An opportunity came up for trade people to work in Australia for 2 years, so I applied. That as nearly 70 years ago. It was this disillusionment with my life in Germany that I did not go back at the end of my contract. I chose for a better life in Australia and I have, Change For Better, I thought.

So just think how lucky you are to grow up in a peaceful country.




